TALKING TO JUDY CORNWELL



In 2008 the OMA was delighted to welcome **Judy Cornwell and her husband John** to the Le Strange Arms Hotel Old Hunstanton to help us
celebrate our annual OMA Reunion weekend. After some exhaustive
detective work, our own **Pat Frost** had established that Judy truly was an
Old Michaelian and every effort was made to persuade Judy and John to
join us all in Old Hunstanton for our Reunion. Ten years has passed by since
then and my wife Angela and I found out that Judy was appearing on stage
at our local Yvonne Arnaud Theatre here in Guildford in the annual

Pantomime production of Dick Whittington as 'Fairy Bowbells'. The following interview was given by Alex D'Arcy from "The Guide 2 Surrey" who has kindly given his permission for us to publish this interview. Ed.

You came to Yvonne Arnaud in Guildford this December to play Fairy Bowbells in the classic fairy tale Dick Whittington.

Well, I was there playing Miss Marple in 2015 and that's when I met Jamie Barber (Director) who's just lovely. He said to me, 'do you want to be a fairy?' I said, 'Oh. That would be lovely. I really fancy being a fairy. So I talked with the producer and after making a few useful suggestions about the draft script, everything was agreed. It is a lovely cast and we all met for the first time for a photo opportunity. I played Miss Marple during 2015/16 all over the country but the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre is really lovely with comfortable dressing rooms and lovely people and I am really looking forward to it. And I'm switching on the Christmas lights for Guildford High Street and that will be a 1st for me!!

Pantomimes are notoriously labour intensive with some days seeing no less than three performances – how do you cope?

They are hard going! The rest of the cast are much younger than me, I'll be 78 in February, so I will sleep between shows as I have a little bed in my dressing room which is what I usually do anyway. But I live on sausage rolls and they are a wonderful pick me up. On a matinee day I have a good breakfast and then a sausage roll between shows. If it's just one show a day then I can have a proper lunch but I have to watch my diet when I am working.

You are of course no stranger to Pantomime and indeed started your career amongst the festive furore as a dancer and singer in Pantomime. Has much changed in the Pantomime game since you first entered the fray?

Oh! I started in Pantomime 63 years ago. I was a dancer and I watched the Cinderella part from the wings. She became ill and I took over at the age of 15. Pantomime hasn't changed at all. You still have your dancers, singers and comics and really it is for the children and their parents. For the parents bringing their children, the script and the plot has to be simple and great fun to watch and understand. Although there are a number of different types of Pantomime available these days I think that people search for the traditional type of family Pantomimes. All the children love to join in. What is really special at the Guildford Yvonne Arnaud Theatre is that they insist on performing one show during the run for children who have learning difficulties and that I think is truly wonderful not only for the children but also for the parents.

You played Mrs Claus in the hit Santa Claus The Movie, a film that has created much joy for many viewers. What are your memories of making that movie?

Well. It's a proper Christmas story. We had such fun making the film. Roger Moore was filming his 007 Bond film on an adjacent stage and we were close enough to hear the gossip that was being aired. I can tell you that we heard that there was much criticism voiced about the "poor reindeer in that snow storm". Utter rubbish. Those animals were totally looked after – 100%. I felt sorry for the poor puppeteers who were inside the reindeer costumes and the poor actors! David Huddlestone and I were blasted by these huge fans generating a snow storm producing fake snow. It is terrifying and we were made to carry out take after take for two whole days. It was difficult to speak without swallowing plastic snow but I believe we all made a huge success of our joint attempt to produce a highly acceptable movie that the Producers gave us hampers from Fortnum & Mason. It was a lovely movie to make and a real pleasure to work with David Huddlestone and Dudley Moore. Dudley was such a naughty boy and constantly played tricks on David Huddlestone.

Good luck Judy. We hope to welcome you and John back to NW Norfolk again very soon.

But when a document becomes available outlining the 'players' who were responsible for the management of the OMA back in 1961, everyone should be given the opportunity to read these historic words. Our Thanks to John King for giving us all the chance to re-live life back in the early 60's. Ed.

"At last year's meeting it was generally accepted that the 1960 AGM Minutes were as read (Minutes not available).

At the Annual General Meeting of the Old Michaelian Association in December 1961, when 35 people were present, the Officers and Committee for 1962 were elected as follows:

President: The Rev. R P Pott

Chairman: Mr John Stainsby

Secretary: Miss Geraldine Moorhouse

Treasurer: Mr Peter Noakes

Committee Members: Clifford Wallington, Geoffrey Lake, Michael Lambert, Gordon Wood & Miss Patricia Dove.

Mr Peter Noakes (Treasurer for 1961) presented the Financial Statement. In 1960 the Association had £10.14s 2d in hand. In December 1961 the Balance had risen to £21.17s 4d. £19 had been invested in the TSB. In the year 1960 the Association recorded 20 full members.

At the 1960 Christmas Reunion Dance a profit of £15 was recorded.

The President of the Association, the Rev. R P Pott and Headmaster of St. Michaels School addressed the meeting. He told us that the first edition of 'The Mitre' had been printed. During the past year a considerable re-organisation and improvement work had taken place in the school. The Children's Convalescent Home at Hunstanton had been acquired for classrooms and the original school at Ingoldisthorpe was to be used as a boys boarding house and provide dining facilities for all pupils.

At Heacham a new girl's boarding house has been purchased to accommodate 20 more girls. An extension of the school bus service was made to Kings Lynn. The school still continues to attract 10% of its pupils from abroad and although changes have taken place, staff numbers have increased. The Headmaster suggested that the old students should contribute to the school magazine.

In conclusion the Headmaster informed the Committee Members that the school had become registered by the Ministry of Education in 1960.

It was decided that there would be no Summer Reunion in 1962 but it was suggested that there should be a cricket match and tennis tournament between Old Michaelians and the school.

7 May 2018

At last a decent Bank Holiday! Hardly believable after the weather we have had this year. I hope that the flooding we have experienced in East Anglia has not come too close to you.

This year the Association are having to change our meeting place for this Anniversary Reunion and, although sad in some respects, it does give us an opportunity for a new venue closer to our Heacham roots. (I started my school experience in the dormitory closest to the Heacham Manor in the new building opened by Queen Mary in the fifties.)

Although we didn't produce any Don Bradman's or a Peter May, we did have some decent players in the early 50's. In particular, Freddie Dooman. Fred, a Persian, whose background was hardly cricket, had a wonderful eye for the ball. He was a natural! He often scored more than 50 runs. The pitch was true if nothing else. A 22 yard strip of concrete with a length of coconut matting a third of the way down the pitch at either end. The run ups for the bowlers needed regular attention. Several windows of adjoining cottages were broken as a direct result of enthusiastic batting! We all had decent kit, although somewhat grass stained. All games were played in whites. Usually a 'practice' would be played on a Wednesday and a real match on a Saturday against other schools. Frequently matches were rained off. Home matches would start at 2pm and we were well looked after by the girls who expertly provided refreshments of jam sandwiches and lemonade. There was never any socialising allowed after the match and the visiting team would leave before 6pm. Away games were similar except for the fact that the school team would cram into the School Brouche since it was the main school transport of the time, long before the Commer or Double Decker ex-London bus. Invariably the driver was one of our playing team wearing the customary school cap!! A new boy, newly arrived from Kenya, came to the batting crease with the "box" tied onto his head!!

One year the Headmaster invited a professional coach to the school. He was very old but he had kept wicket for Hampshire for several years.

We all had fun and developed a passion for the game for the rest of our lives.
