It is with great sadness that we report the death of **Andrew Pott.** Andrew died mercifully peacefully in the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital on Wednesday 29 April 2020 after a short illness. Andrew was 71 years old.

The following Obituary has been written by Andrew's twin brother Simon. 'Andrew Jonathan Pott was born on 17 November 1948, the elder twin son of Roger and Isabel Pott, at Heacham Vicarage in Norfolk where his Father had been Vicar for about three years. His Mother, Isabel, had been a Norland Nanny in London, they met and married during the war years. After a series of church appointments his Father, Roger, moved towards teaching of which his principle experience had been as Head of School in Yokohama, Japan where he had lived when he was Chaplain to the Bishop. He returned back to Britain in 1938 as the world headed towards the second World War. After marrying in 1942 Roger and Isabel Pott looked for a suitable parish to live and were fortunate to be offered Heacham where the 'gift of a living' was held by a relative. Not for the first or last time in his life did Roger understand the maxim that 'it was not what you know but who you know that counts'. One bit of exceptional good fortune was the help that Roger and Isabel Pott gave to an elderly American lady who lived at the Vicarage for a short time before she died and left her house, The Shooting Lodge, to the Vicar and his wife for their kindness.

Andrew and his twin Simon were held to be contented because they always had someone with whom to play and photographs show them in a large double pram or held in their parents arms at their Christening. Early memories were of the Day Nursery and the Night Nursery but all of that changed twenty months later when Caroline was born. In the meantime **Andrew** and Simon's Father had been busy exploring the opportunities to teach. Such was the demand for the type of coaching offered that a number of local priests were drafted in to help. The Old Rectory at Ingoldisthorpe was requisitioned and St. Michaels School was created. This is a separate story to be told elsewhere, but **Andrew** and Simon went to the school shortly followed by sister Caroline and stayed at the school until the age of ten. Being the children of the Headmaster was an interesting experience and eventually **Andrew** and Simon were offered 'presentations' to Christ's Hospital in Sussex through the Grocers' Company, a City of London Livery Company who the Pott family had been involved with since 1658.

Andrew and Simon, as twins, developed different interests, hobbies and friends. **Andrew** was more academic and Simon was involved with sport. **Andrew** did very well at 'O' level exams and even better with excellent 'A' level exam results and this allowed **Andrew** to choose Bristol University where he read Geography. He became involved with The Students Union and he was elected Treasurer for a year that was a full time post. With that experience gained, on leaving University he joined Price Waterhouse and was destined for a career in Accountancy where he seemed to have a bright future but his political tendencies found attraction in joining the Solon Housing Association and becoming involved with politics in the region moving swiftly through the ranks and, in due course, becoming the leader of Avon County Council. A very prestigious position.

Andy, as he became known, married Helen in 1978 with his twin brother Simon as his Best Man. The couple left Bristol in 1986 and moved to Stockport where Andy worked first at the Manchester Metropolitan University before moving on to Salford University. Their children Alexandra and Jonathan were both born in Stockport and have both become successful. Alex as an outstanding young business woman and Jon as a highly talented Chef achieving Michelin level.

More than twenty years ago the family moved to live in Norwich where Andy was in charge of many aspects of student life at The University of East Anglia. **Andrew** retired at the age of sixty but it was, perhaps, a crowning achievement at the end of his career with Universities that he threw himself wholeheartedly into his voluntary work at Norwich Rugby Football Club and you can read a full account of this exceptional period of his life here in **'The Mitre'**

I know that all of our Readers will want to express an enormous word of 'Thanks' to Simon for taking the time to write this Obituary to his twin brother Andrew and, furthermore, I know that you will all wish to join with me in offering to Helen, Alexandra, Jonathan, Simon and Jenny and the whole of the Pott Family our deepest sympathy and condolences at this time. Ed.

RUGBY CLUB STALWART WAS A 'GREAT FRIEND' AND 'EXCEPTIONAL VOLUNTEER'



Tributes have been paid to an "exceptional volunteer" who dedicated two decades of service to the rugby club he loved.

Andy Pott, secretary and former president of Norwich Rugby Club (NRFC) died at the age of 71 on Wednesday

29 April 2020 following a short illness. He lived in Norfolk's county town and leaves behind his wife Helen and two children. Mr Pott's contribution to NRFC, spreading back over 21 years, has been described by the Club as "immense" acknowledged last year when he was made an honorary member. In recent times he was most widely known for his administrative roles but they were only the tip of the iceberg after a career helping talented young players through the ranks. With the current season having ended due to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, Mr Pott lived to see the senior first team promoted from the London 2 North East Division after going unbeaten in their first 18 games.

Andy Micklethwaite, Communications Officer at NRFC said, **"We owe Andy a** huge debt and are grateful, after all his years of service, that he was able to see the 1st XV promoted into London 1 North prior to becoming unwell. He will be sadly missed by us all at NRFC as a very efficient and meticulous administrator, an exceptional volunteer and a great friend".

The list of tasks undertaken by Mr Pott during his time at the club was extensive and his devotion to NRFC and the game of Rugby dominated his social life. Recognising the importance for a club to develop its own players through a strong youth and mini system his heart was in coaching and seeing those young players progress through tom the senior sides. Then, eight years ago in 2012, long after hanging up his coaching boots, Mr Pott found a junior team – now the under 16's, dusted off his kit and started all over again.

Even as his health deteriorated there was no sign of Mr Pott slowing down as he became a key figure in the Development Group and the clubs drawn out attempts to relocate to the University of East Anglia Colney Lane playing fields.
