

across a collection, or the odd photograph hidden away in a drawer somewhere, we would be delighted to display it/them along with all of the others.






Food for Thought


Fast forward to the present. You are old! But nothing has changed, for me at least.



Airwaves Downunder

On reaching retirement, there is one single question to ask – "What are you going to do with all the spare time?"

After a short time, it was very obvious that retirement is <u>not</u> full of spare time. It is one of doing the things that you have wanted to do for many years but never really had the time. And so it was for me. Yes, we would go on trips to lands near and far, tend the garden, carry out house repairs as needed rather than putting them off until you had a spare moment/hour/day or calling in a tradesperson, play some golf, help the family as and when needed, listen to music/go to 'live' performances and get involved in various volunteer and church activities.

Ever since my very young years I have enjoyed and had an interest in music, but more particularly church/choral/organ music and jazz. A local radio station in Sydney, **2MBS FM ("Station")** run by volunteers, devotes most of its

broadcasting time to classical music and jazz and I listen to this Station frequently. The radio station has been operating for 35 years and, with a wide range of enthusiastic volunteers from different backgrounds and great knowledge on various aspects of music, has given enjoyment to Sydney and regional listeners. Now, with the recently extended internet service, the Station broadcasts worldwide. The Station is also a valuable participant in Sydney's fine music scene encouraging Australian compositions and performers.

After I retired I was listening one Sunday to their weekly program 'Evensong' and realised that the lady presenter seemed a little hesitant in her introductions. This was most unusual. Coincidently, I subsequently met a former work colleague who was telling me about a radio station who involved themselves in volunteer programming work and 'Yes', it was 2MBS FM. I mentioned to my colleague about the lady presenter and he explained to me that she is nearly blind, in her late 80's, did most of the presentation from memory of the music and knowledge of choirs and was prompted by another person who operated the studio.

"Is there anything that I can do to assist her?" I asked.

After a short while I was invited to attend an interview by the Station and to meet this very English lady presenter who was the voice of Evensong every Sunday and known to a wide audience and during these discussions I was asked if I could help by preparing the programme scripts but so long as it was prepared in **BOLD PRINT 24/26 FONT SIZE.**

I was told that I would be advised of CD tracks selected, timing allowed for introductions, back announcements and words from the sponsors, all to be squeezed into a one hour time slot.

The deed was done. I started work at the Station immediately. Writing about music I had sung at Canterbury, St. Michael's and other choirs was a whole new world to me and I continued in this supporting role until, unfortunately, the health of the lady presenter began to deteriorate and, with much sadness, she passed away quite suddenly two years later. The Station management decided to continue a similar style of programming under a new title "Hosanna". The music form would still be sacred and a small team of programmers/presenters would be led by the former head of the Royal School of Church Music in Australia. Three other people would make up the team of four to present this weekly program. Another lady who has a great interest in church music, a guy from the North of England, who I had already worked with and I was also invited to join this select group of people. So, back to 2MBS FM I went but this time it would be different – a programmer and presenter in my own right.

After various voice trials, studio training, given a list of "do's" and "do not's" together with a general understanding of the vast array of equipment, I submitted a 30 minute recording for review by the Programming Committee. I was then invited to complete an application to become a programmer/presenter for the Station and, in particularly, for the programme 'Hosanna'.

This was a new world for me and a steep learning curve. Sitting alone in a studio with lights, speakers, head phones, a mass of switches, a stack of recording machines, meters indicating the loudness of the broadcast voice and the variable volume of the music was, to say the least, a little concerning. And if that was not enough to worry about, I had an audience I could not see!!. This was a far cry from singing in a choir where one had an immediate feedback from the choir master and could see the reactions of the congregation or your fellow choristers.

At least three months before each scheduled programme, I get to select the music, trying to remember each and every religious festival/national event, prepare a programme schedule and submit it for approval. Only after all of these procedures have been completed am I allowed to present the programme. I have now been with the Station as a presenter for three years and the enjoyment is growing.

I now have a regular spot on the fifth Sunday in the month (when that occurs) and, with filling in for other presenters, means that I get to air about 8 – 10 times each year. My next confirmed scheduled *'Hosanna'* programmes are on 30 May and 29 August and include music by composers Stanford, Bairstow, Wood, Vaughan Williams and others. This programme goes to air on Sundays at 17:00 (local time) and can be heard on www.2mbs.com.au

Retirement, therefore, is the time in life to enjoy yourself. Like many others, I sometimes wonder how I ever had the time to go to proper work!!! My best wishes to you all and please let me know if you do listen to our programmes.

JW. My sincere thanks, Michael, to your agreement to contribute to 'The Mitre' this year and agreeing to take part in this interview. Could I begin by asking you where you were born?

MP. Derby. My Grandfather had a Pork Butchers shop on Derby market. He used to sit me in the shop window eating a pork pie to advertise the high quality products!

MP. Freedom! Compared to my previous school, everything was so different. I suppose in a word I found happiness.

JW. Okay. Well, what did you dislike about the school?

MP. I have thought about this question and the only sensible answer I can give you is the fact that Rugby was not played at the school. Having said that, I really had no idea I would become such a fanatic of Rugby in later life. Oh



yes! Fish on Friday was not something I easily accepted.

JW. Did you have a favourite teacher?

MP. Without a doubt I did......Henry Taylor. He was such a softy. My favourite subject was

JW. Where did you meet your wife Doreen?

MP. We met at Butlins Holiday Camp and we have been married 52 years.

JW. What makes you laugh?

Enclosed with this publication is a Membership Survey Form which will enable you to complete and return, as soon as possible, and return to me using the stamped addressed envelope provided.




What always amazes me is the number of people who come together each year with those who have
